This phrase is inscribed on the medal (Holocaust SZ-55, O2) issued by special order for Severin Szperling to honor and remember his parents, Nechuma (Prybulska) and Michal Szperling, from the city of Czestochowa, Poland. The phrase is essential to preserving the memory of each Jew of the six million who perished in the Holocaust.

I have prepared this catalog in dedication to the memory of my parents.

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Author's Note

Many institutions in the world have issued Holocaust-related medals, but no one has yet tracked such medals' sources and dates of issue. Doing just this is my purpose in preparing this catalog, dedicated to the memory of my parents. In doing so, I have spent uncounted thousands of hours over the last ten years traveling throughout Europe from one concentration camp to another—thirteen in total—visiting museums and mint companies, meeting with designers and private individuals, and visiting all types of Jewish institutions. From my home in Tucson, Arizona, I have made hundreds of telephone calls, mailed hundreds of letters and photocopies, and sent hundreds of faxes and emails around the world, seeking help in gathering information and translating the foreign inscriptions on the medals.

In this catalog, I provide the reader with as many details as possible about each medal. Medals are grouped according to subject and ordered by year of issue. Each page of the catalog begins with an identification number (SZ number) as well as photographs and descriptions of both sides of the medal. Medals marked by an asterisk can be found in my private collection. In addition, known details about each medal (such as its designer, material, and circulation, as well as when and where it was struck or cast) are provided. I continue to search for information currently missing about some medals, and I am always looking for new Holocaust-related medals to complete my collection. I am interested in purchasing any of the unmarked medals in the catalog, as well as any medals unknown to me. Preface

There are many different ways by which people keep alive the memory of the Holocaust. Some erect monuments, create statues, and build museums. Others write books, shoot films, compose music, and paint artwork. Still others lecture in schools and work to keep memories alive in their communities. Each type of expression preserves an essential part of our memory—an anniversary, a country's history, a people's culture.

Severin Szperling collects commemorative medals and coins that have been struck and cast to honor the people affected by, and commemorate the events of, the Holocaust that occurred during the Nazi German occupation of Europe in World War II. Severin has created this numismatic catalog to keep alive the memory of his parents, and the memories of all the victims of the Holocaust.

What follows is a short history describing the path that led to the compilation of this catalog.

Severin Szperling was born during the Nazi occupation of Poland in the Czestochowa Jewish Quarter in March 1940—after April 9, 1941, the Jewish ghetto. His parents were Nechuma Prybulska and Michal Szperling. Wishing to protect their only son, after a year and a half in the ghetto, Szperling's parents smuggled their twoand-a-half-year-old son out of the ghetto to the Aryan side, where a Christian couple, Anna and Stanislaw Pociepny, promised to hide Severin until the end of the war, when his parents would come for him.

Severin survived the Holocaust hiding in and around the Pociepnys' house, in a barrel in their backyard and underneath a rabbit hutch in a hole dug under their home. This was his childhood until the liberation of the city on January 18, 1945. In 1943, during his hiding, his parents, as part of a group of 125 Jews, were executed in the local Jewish cemetery. Most of Czestochowa's Jewish population was deported, and perished in the Treblinka Extermination Camp. Severin spent the next 23 years with the Pociepnys, who gave him their family name and raised him as a Catholic. During his adolescence, Severin learned that his biological parents had been murdered by the Nazis, and that he had family still living in Israel.


In 1964, Severin visited Israel, where he learned about his remaining family, rediscovered Judaism, and found the only existing photograph of his father; none of his mother has yet surfaced. Upon his return to Poland in 1965, Severin worked as a mechanical draftsman in a textile plant, but during the growing anti-Semitic campaign in Poland in the late 1960s decided to pursue emigration. With the help of the Hebrew Immigration Aid Society in 1970, Severin was stripped of his Polish citizenship and left Poland permanently. He traveled to Vienna and Rome and eventually came to Cleveland, Ohio. Two months later, he moved to Chicago, Illinois, where he lived for the next twenty-five years. During this time, he had his fiancée, Alfreda, brought from Czestochowa. They married and had two daughters. After graduating from construction school, Severin opened his own construction company in Chicago. In 1996, he and his family moved to Tucson, Arizona, to run a hotel. In 2002, Severin and his wife retired.

Severin still visits his hometown in Poland regularly. His first stop is always the Jewish cemetery, where his parents lie buried in an unmarked mass grave. Next, he goes to the Catholic cemetery to visit the graves of the Pociepnys.

Since 1972, Severin Szperling has been collecting medals that commemorate the victims of the Holocaust. He has pursued this passion full-time during his retirement. Szperling has become a world-renowned numismatist as he has built his collection over the last thirty-eight years, traveling Europe to search out medals and coins that depict concentration and work camps, ghetto uprisings, and historical figures from the Holocaust era. His collection consists of more than 430 medals and coins in different metals, shapes, weights, sizes, and colors, originating since 1945 from mints, governments, and private entities in fourteen countries—the United States, Israel, Poland, the Czech Republic, France, the Netherlands, Belgium, Italy, Greece, the United Kingdom, Germany, Hungary, Denmark, and Russia. Szperling has written several articles for the American Israel Numismatic Association and has displayed his collection for a local numismatic club, for local Jewish organizations in Arizona, and for the Janusz Korczak Association of Canada. He is a member of the American Numismatic Association, the American Israel Numismatic Association, and the Polish American Numismatic Association.
